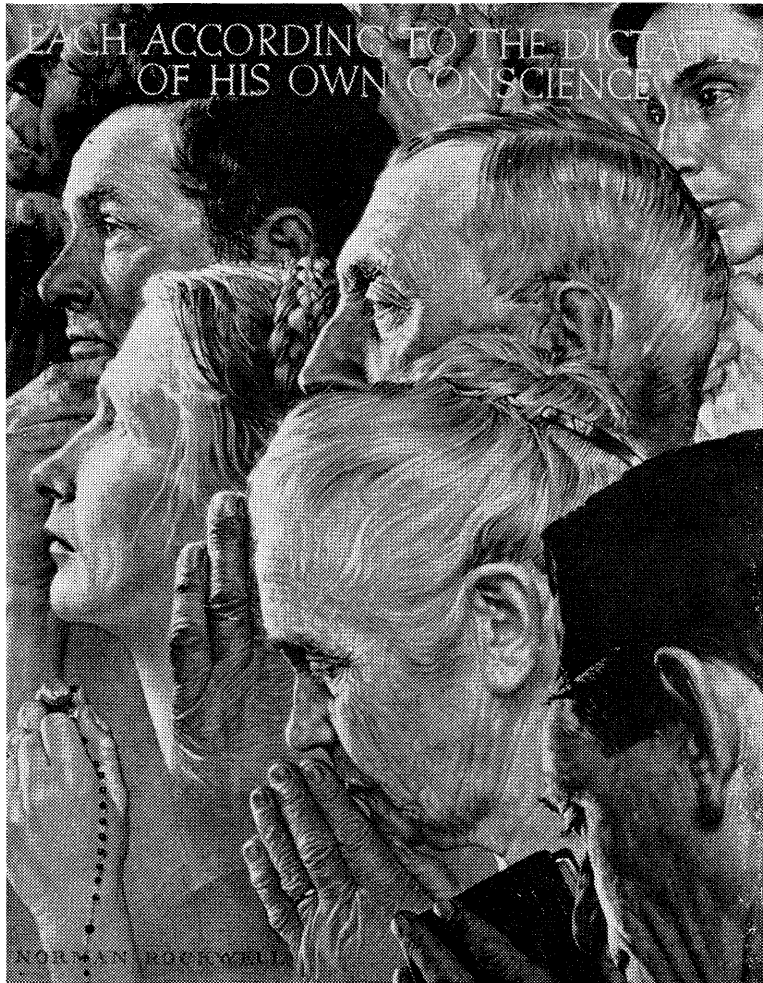

GENERAL CONVENTION DIARY

(Continued)

Monday, October 4—Met with House of Deputies. Joint Session in the afternoon to hear report of the Army and Navy Commission presented by Bishop Sherrill of Massachusetts (preached at Christ Church one day last year). Excellent report. On the stage among others was Chaplain Henry Bell Hodgkins, formerly of Columbia, Tennessee. United Thank Offering of the women announced as \$1,119,000—the largest one ever. In 1928 it was \$1,101,000.) Dined with the Rev. Allen Person of the Diocese of Lexington. Had visit with The Rev. Philip Jensen of Baltimore.

Tuesday—Breakfast with Bishop McKinstry of Delaware. In House of Deputies heard excellent report made by Canon Sharp of Nashville on Codification and Rearrangement of the Canons of the Church. Lunch with the Rt. Rev. Everett H. Jones, new Bishop of West Texas. Saw Bishop Manning of New York. He spoke of the "five happy years I spent at Christ Church." Bishop Keeler of Minnesota (noon-day preacher in 1942) had me with a group to dinner at the Union Club—other guests Bishops Dandridge, Carpenter of Alabama, and Blakenship of Cuba. Conferred with the Rev. Bill Mesco of Florida on a proposed resolution regarding Church Schools.

Wednesday — In House of Deputies heard presentation of the Compromise resolutions on Union with the Presbyterians. Dean Angus Dun of the Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge, made one of the best addresses of the Convention. House moved to continue

negotiations with the Presbyterians. Lunched with Rev. Moultrie Guerry of Norfolk, Sumner Guerry of Charleston and Bishop Gravatt of Upper South Carolina. Heard fine report on social reconstruction. Dined as guest of Mr. Edmund Orgill of Memphis (brother of Mrs. Paul Sloan, Jr.) other guests: Bishop Maxon, Mr. Wright, and Mr. Bartow Strang of Chattanooga. Conferred with Bishop Davis of Western New York and other members of the Marriage Commission.

Thursday—Breakfast with the Rev. Capers Satterlee of Mobile. Day in House of Deputies given to discussion of the Marriage Canon. Our Commission recommended a more generous Canon than the present one. Whole matter became much involved in parliamentary procedure. In the evening went to dinner with friends in Cleveland who took me to the Cleveland Playhouse where we saw a delightful comedy—"Papa is All."

Friday—House of Deputies still debate Marriage Canon. Made brief talk in favor of the proposal of our Commission. Joint session to hear Dr. Henry Sloan Coffin, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church (Northern) make excellent address. Well received. Program and Budget of General Church presented by Bishop Washburn. The Convention voted a forward looking program nearly three hundred thousand dollars in excess of that suggested by The National Council. Convention accepted invitation to meet in San Francisco in 1946. Lunched with Bishops Clingman of Kentucky and Carpenter of Alabama and the Rev. John Turner of Birmingham. Marriage-Divorce Canon debate resumed in House of Deputies. The House plainly favored a more liberal legislation but never reached an agreement on any specific change. Many votes by orders taken.

Attended "Sewanee Dinner" at Hotel Statler. Addresses made by Bishop Maxon and Bishop Manning. Went to night session of House of Deputies.

Saturday—Breakfast with the Rev. Frank J. Knapp of Montpelier, Vermont. Heard Dean Haines of Louisville (noon-day preacher, 1942) present Program and Budget in House of Deputies. I was appointed on the General Church Army and Navy Commission. Lunched with Dr. Earl Jewell (noon-day preacher 1941) of Kansas City and his Senior Warden. Voted to confirm election by House of Bishops of five Missionary bishops for Alaska, Puerto Rico, Honolulu, San Joaquin, Haiti.

Sunday—Breakfasted with the Rev. Francis Wakefield of Gainesville, Florida, and the Rev. Dr. Henry Lewis of Ann Arbor, Michigan. Went with Mr. Douglas Wright to Trinity Cathedral for eleven o'clock service. Bishop Stevens of Los Angeles preached a good sermon. Lunched with Mr. and Mrs. George D. Wilson of Houston, Texas. (Mr. Wilson was one of my Senior Wardens at Trinity Church.) Attended afternoon session of House of Deputies. (This is by far the hardest working of the four Conventions I have attended.) Debate on administration of Holy Communion by intinction and by "Communion in one kind." House approved both, but both were rejected by the Bishops "until referred to Lambeth Conference." Dined with the Rt. Rev. and Mrs. Everett H. Jones and saw Dean Zabriskie of Virginia Theological Seminary.

Monday—House of Deputies met at nine o'clock. Many matters still on the calendar to be cleared up. Hottest debate on treatment of Conscientious Objectors. Lunched with Bishop Maxon. Convention adjourned in late afternoon. Took night train for Nashville.

PRESIDING BISHOP'S REPORT TO THE CHURCH SUNDAY

Bishop Dagwell of Oregon Speaking In Nashville

Christ Church welcomes to her pulpit today the Right Reverend Benjamin D. Dagwell, D.D., Bishop of Oregon. Bishop Dagwell studied at the University of Cincinnati. His theological work was obtained at the Seabury Divinity School and at the General Theological Seminary. He was ordained to the Priesthood by Bishop Matthews in 1917, and he was Consecrated Bishop of Oregon in 1936. Prior to his consecration he held parishes in New Jersey and Colorado. Bishop Dagwell's last charge was the Deanship of St. John's Cathedral in Denver, which he held for twelve years. He is Presid-

ing Bishop Tucker's representative and is one of a number of church leaders who are making reports to the Church from the General Convention in all of the dioceses of the American Church. There will be an interparochial meeting to hear Bishop Dagwell's report to the Church at the Church of the Advent at 7:30 o'clock. All officers of parish organizations, members of the Vestry and Council, and canvass leaders, and all those interested in the Missionary program of the Church are asked to attend.
