THE OLD TESTAMENT LESSON – Ezekiel 2:1-5

The LORD said to me: O mortal, stand up on your feet, and I will speak with you. And when he spoke to me, a spirit entered into me and set me on my feet; and I heard him speaking to me. He said to me, Mortal, I am sending you to the people of Israel, to a nation of rebels who have rebelled against me; they and their ancestors have transgressed against me to this very day. The descendants are impudent and stubborn. I am sending you to them, and you shall say to them, "Thus says the Lord GOD." Whether they hear or refuse to hear (for they are a rebellious house), they shall know that there has been a prophet among them.

THE NEW TESTAMENT LESSON – 2 Corinthians 12:2-10

I know a person in Christ who fourteen years ago was caught up to the third heaven--whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows. And I know that such a person--whether in the body or out of the body I do not know; God knows--was caught up into Paradise and heard things that are not to be told, that no mortal is permitted to repeat. On behalf of such a one I will boast, but on my own behalf I will not boast, except of my weaknesses. But if I wish to boast, I will not be a fool, for I will be speaking the truth. But I refrain from it, so that no one may think better of me than what is seen in me or heard from me, even considering the exceptional character of the revelations. Therefore, to keep me from being too elated, a thorn was given me in the flesh, a messenger of Satan to torment me, to keep me from being too elated. Three times I appealed to the Lord about this, that it would leave me, but he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." So, I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may dwell in me. Therefore I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities for the sake of Christ; for whenever I am weak, then I am strong.

THE GOSPEL LESSON – Mark 6:1-13

Jesus left that place and came to his hometown, and his disciples followed him. On the sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, "Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offense at him. Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honor, except in their hometown, and among their own kin, and in their own house." And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. And he was amazed at their unbelief.

Then he went about among the villages teaching. He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. He said to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

THE BRASS EWER

Given to the Glory of God and to Christ Church. Mrs. Charles Schiff, sister of Kate Burch Warner, presented the church with a brass ewer for the holy water for baptisms. Her daughter Mary Burch Schiff was baptized in Christ Church Chapel on December 20, 1890, by the Rt. Reverend C.T. Quintard, Bishop of Tennessee, and the Reverend James R. Winchester, Rector of Christ Church. A portrait of the Schiff children is in the Cheekwood collection. The Schiffs lived in England. The 1888 chapel on McLemore Street (9th Avenue North), designed by Francis Hatch Kimball, served the congregation for 28 years until replaced by the present chapel adjacent to the chancel. The brass ewer is still used in baptisms at the Cathedral today.

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY (EfM)



EfM is a Christian education and formation program developed by the School of Theology at Sewanee, which takes place at Episcopal churches across the country and online. EfM covers the basics of a theological education in the Old and New Testaments, church history, liturgy, and theology with emphasis on theological reflection. Students enroll for one year at a time and complete the course in four years. More information is available on the EfM website, efm.sewanee.edu. The cost is \$350/year. Partial scholarships may be available. Christ Church groups meet on Tuesday evenings or Wednesday mornings during the academic year and each has room for a limited number of new students. "Hands of Mercy" events are one-time opportunities for members of the Cathedral congregation to serve and benefit a worthy institution supported by the Cathedral. The next Hands of Mercy event will be August 22, 2015, at the Nashville Food Project, located on the campus of Woodmont Christian Church at 3605 Hillsboro Pike. Approximately 35 volunteers are needed to work in TNFP's garden and prepare food. Garden volunteers will work from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m., and food prep will take place from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. The food prep team will prepare meals in the kitchen, using recovered, donated, and garden-grown food to cook healthy hot meals. There's a lot of creativity involved in planning meals based on what comes in from the food donation partners—and a lot of work for the volunteers who chop, slice, clean, assemble, blanch, compost, and cook. Children age 10 and up are welcome to participate, so this will be a wonderful opportunity for families to work together to help the vulnerable populations served by the Nashville Food Project.
