THE NEW TESTAMENT LESSON – James 3:1-12

Not many of you should become teachers, my brothers and sisters, for you know that we who teach will be judged with greater strictness. For all of us make many mistakes. Anyone who makes no mistakes in speaking is perfect, able to keep the whole body in check with a bridle. If we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we guide their whole bodies. Or look at ships: though they are so large that it takes strong winds to drive them, yet they are guided by a very small rudder wherever the will of the pilot directs. So also the tongue is a small member, yet it boasts of great exploits.

How great a forest is set ablaze by a small fire! And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is placed among our members as a world of iniquity; it stains the whole body, sets on fire the cycle of nature, and is itself set on fire by hell. For every species of beast and bird, of reptile and sea creature, can be tamed and has been tamed by the human species, but no one can tame the tongue—a restless evil, full of deadly poison. With it we bless the Lord and Father, and with it we curse those who are made in the likeness of God. From the same mouth come blessing and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this ought not to be so. Does a spring pour forth from the same opening both fresh and brackish water? Can a fig tree, my brothers and sisters, yield olives, or a grapevine figs? No more can salt water yield fresh.

THE GOSPEL LESSON – Mark 8:29-38

Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, “Who do people say that I am?” And they answered him, “John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets.” He asked them, “But who do you say that I am?” Peter answered him, “You are the Messiah.” And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him.

Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, “Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.”

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, “If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.”

CHURCH SCHOOL

The adult program at Christ Church Cathedral offers a variety of courses for parishioners to grow in their faith. Classes take place on Sunday mornings, Wednesday evenings or throughout the week. Special intergenerational events also take place during the church year.

SUNDAY MORNING PROGRAMS

The following adult classes meet **from September to May** during the Sunday School Hour, from 9:45 a.m. to 10:45 a.m. each Sunday.

Sunday Forum - Led by Dean Timothy Kimbrough. This class will present a variety of theological, social and spiritual themes during the course of the year. Today's Sunday forum will be a review of the Dean's sabbatical experiences and a look ahead at topics and speakers for this year's Sunday Forum. (Parish Hall)

Centering Prayer - The Centering Prayer Class practices a prayer of the heart, a prayer of simplicity, a prayer of faith, a prayer of simple regard; a method of reducing the obstacles to the gift of contemplative prayer and of facilitating the development of habits conducive to responding to the inspirations of the Spirit. The principal text for those interested in Centering Prayer is Thomas Keating's book, *Open Mind, Open Heart*. (Cathedral Annex Building)

Faith & Family Matters - Facilitated by Hannah and John Lavey. Faith & Family Matters is a Sunday morning class that focuses on this question: How do we, as Episcopalians, access our faith in our families: as children of aging parents, as children in our own families of origin, as partners to one another (in all the ways partnership is defined) and as parents to children of all ages. It also hopes to be a place of sanctuary and sharing for our community. (Chapel)

Sitting with Scripture: Lectionary Readings for Listening Ears - Facilitated by Ben Curtis, Lyonel Gilmer, Keith Meador and Rod Murray. Using the lectionary readings of the day, the intent of this class is to foster a contemplative atmosphere where participants encounter the Written Word with open hearts as well as reflective minds. The ancient *Lectio Divina* and the story of Mary sitting at the feet of Jesus will serve as models for this class. (Cathedral Annex Building)

TRIUMPHAL ENTRY WINDOW GIVEN TO THE GLORY OF GOD AND IN MEMORY OF HARVEY PRIDE

The Pride family was committed to the work of Christ Church in downtown Nashville. His wife Eran Dantzler Pride was the beloved Christ Church nursery school teacher. The window was given by Mrs. Pride. In Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem windows, we see Jesus riding the little colt and the people, with palm branches, shouting "Hosanna." Designed by Rambusch & Company of New York, the Palm Sunday windows were dedicated in 1961. The windows are located in the west clerestory (upper left side).
