CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

We are slowly approaching the end of the year. Not in our academic calendar, our financial calendar or even the one we may still keep in the kitchen with the details of our busy lives. We are approaching the end of the church year. The ebbs and flows of feasts and fasts are possibly the primary calendar events we should be paying attention to as we engage in this life of ours.



In the Level I atria the children are celebrating the gifts they have been given as they learn to set up a prayer table. A place where they can thank God for the gifts they have received. At home do you have a place set apart to pray, to say thank you or please, to stop and listen? Someplace that is out of the busyness of the rest of our lives. A simple prayer card or a candle can set this space apart.

In Level II the liturgical calendar is a visual tool and those children may be better able to tell you how close we are to Advent. This is the month when we remember St Francis and St Luke. Both of them are people of compassion who answered the call they were hearing from God. They responded to the gifts that He had given them in their everyday lives. These basic tools, knowledge that builds faith, make it possible for the older children to spread their world view. What tools do you need to hone, what practices do you want to incorporate into your daily calendar?
